my words shall proclaim Thy praise." We say Matins, consisting of psalms and readings, responsively from right side to left side. Matins is followed by the Eucharist. The rites I spoke of above take place every day either during the Eucharist or during the Office depending on which rite is being held. Noon prayer happens at lunch time, and is the shortest of the day. The afternoon free time as well as in the morning is used for private prayer, Lectio Divina, or whatever we choose to do including enjoying the beauty of nature and the area. We pray Vespers before dinner; and after dinner, we pray Compline. After Compline, we have the opportunity to get together socially until the Grand Silence at 10 pm. Each of us has a private room while at Convocation and our social evenings plus our lunch and dinner times when we really get to know one another and forge some lasting relationships with the ones we have spent so much ZOOM time. Needless to say, leaving is always bittersweet and we look forward to Monday evening when we can see one another again if only on ZOOM!

The Benedictine Way of Life

When I returned from Convocation this past June, I was surprised at how many people asked me what I did all week and what was it like at Conception Monastery in Missouri. So, I hope this little insight into what I did and am doing might engender interest in others who may be wondering why someone my age and stage in my life would enter religious life. First of all, our group is world wide and religious members live all over the United States, in Canada, Europe, and even South America. We number over 60 members who consist of a dispersed community which means we continue to live where we are so we do not live together in a monastery. However, we meet regularly each week on ZOOM for praying the Divine Office together. Members are categorized in different stages according to when and why they entered. The first year of acceptance is the Postulant year; followed by two years as Novices; and finally, the three years as annually vowed members until in the third year final vows are taken. We wear a black habit as do all Benedictines, and we are part of the Episcopal Church, even though we have our Convocation at the Catholic Benedictine Conception Abbey. There are also two types of religious, vowed members and Oblates. Vowed members take final vows of stability, obedience and conversion of life; while Oblates make promises which are less binding.

The highlight for most of us is the opportunity to attend Convocation twice a year. The larger one occurs in June and the smaller one in October. During June all of the rites take place. Aspirants are accepted as Postulants; Postulants receive their habits and religious name and enter into their Novitiate; 2nd year Novices take first or annual vows; and third year annual vowed religious take final vows. Men receive the name Brother, and women are known with the Sister. The Abbot, who is the Head of the group; chooses the name of the religious from one of the three he or she has submitted with the reasons for choosing that particular name. Interestingly enough, Sister Marie Patricia was my third choice, and I only put it in there because all my family and relatives call me by my nickname Patty from Marie Patricia. I was not only surprised when the Abbot gave me that name, but I realized how delighted and perfect it was. (We had to explain why we gave the three choices we did, but I just threw that name into the mix because I really needed three names!)

During Convocation our day is structured around the Hours of the Divine Office. In the morning after breakfast, which we eat in silence because the Great Silence begins at 10 PM, we go to the Oratory and the first words are "The Lord Will Open my mouth; and

Parents are welcome to help out as well. This year, this class will also have Saints in Training graduates assisting with some classes mentoring our younger students. 

Michael Richardson from the Rivers & Mountains GreenFaith Circle will lead an interactive conversation on how to move your personal finances away from funding fossil fuel extraction, production and distribution... and instead see your deposits, premiums and investments used to fund local businesses and farms, affordable housing, and development of regenerative clean energy.

#1 Personal Banking: If you bank with Chase, Citi, Wells Fargo, Bank of America, TD Bank, U.S. Bank or other major Wall Street banks, your money is being used to fund climate destruction. There are many local options that use your deposits to fund local ventures and not for fossil fuel projects. Learn how to find such regional and local community banks and credit unions.

#3 Home & Auto Insurance: If you insure your home and/or auto with Liberty Mutual, Travelers, All-State, GEICO, State Farm or other major insurance companies, then your money is being used to both insure and invest in the excavation, production and distribution of oil, tar sands, coal and gas. Learn how to find small insurance companies - some based in New York State - that do not insure nor invest in fossil fuel projects.

#2 Credit Cards: If you have credit cards with Chase, Citi, Bank of America, Wells Fargo, Capital One, or Credit One, your money is being used to fund an economy dependent on fossil fuel rather than transitioning to renewable sources. Learn how to find a truly "green" credit card.

#4 Retirement Investments: Most financial institutions are complicit in the climate crisis. Wall Street banks provide hundreds of billions of dollars in loans to the fossil fuel industry. Asset managers - companies that people pay to manage and invest their money - are the world's largest investors in fossil fuels. Learn about the funds you are investing in and the alternatives... and how to find an environmentally conscious financial advisor.



Green Corner by Kip Coerper

Recycling is complicated. Fortunately, New York State is one of the top 10 recycling states in the nation. The majority of residents in Onondaga County, are attempting to recycle. 51% of the material in our total waste stream is recycled. Over 65% of paper is recycled and a large percentage of aluminum as well. Plastic is more problematic. However, because our waterways and wildlife are grossly polluted by it, it is important for us to make an effort to reuse or recycle plastic. The first thing to ponder with plastic is - can you avoid purchasing it? Plastic wrap around some food products may be necessary. But perhaps you could look for a salad dressing in a glass container rather than a plastic container. Or perhaps you make your own salad dressing with oil and vinegar stored in glass bottles. Glass is easier to recycle and does not harm the environment, unlike plastic.

Onondaga County guidelines can be found at <https://ocrra.org/services/recycle/> They include:

Plastics: Ignore the numbers; use shape to decide recyclability: bottle, jar, jug or dairy tub = recycle.

Paper: Empty and flatten boxes. Remove packing or film plastics in or around boxes.

Containers: Must be empty and rinsed.

Labels are okay.

Lids and caps: Reattach.

Cayuga County <https://www.auburnny.gov/sites/g/files/vyhlf4131/f/uploads/streamlinesinglepgsjuly2021.pdf> uses the following guidelines:

Co-Mingle Recycling – Mixed combination of cleaned and flattened:

- Newspaper/Magazines/Cardboard
- Glass containers
- Metal containers
- Plastic containers (Consumer Grade 1-7)
- All items shall be cleaned and flattened if possible
- Plastic shopping bags should be returned to the store you received them from.

DO NOT recycle junk mail, broken glass, light bulbs, mirrors, plate glass, cookware, styrofoam or plastic shopping bags.

Please note that recyclables should be loose in the bin – not in plastic bags. Your items will be considered trash, if in a plastic bag or garbage bag.

Also note that the **Village of Skaneateles** is starting a recycling program with 2 bins in Clift Park – and 1 bin in Thayer Park. Please look for the recycling bins for **cans and bottles** when you have that trash in our parks.

If you would be interested in more recycling options, or have questions concerning our environment, please contact the Skaneateles Environmental and Advisory Committee at <https://www.villageofskaneateles.com/bc-eac> If you really care about the environmental impact of plastic, consider purchasing a box from **Terracycle.com** and fill it with all the plastic waste and other products, including clothing, that are not normally recycled and send it back to them postage free. They then will turn the plastic into raw material that is used to create new products.

We believe we have a responsibility to care for our natural resources, be responsible stewards of God's creation, and share the importance of caring for creation with others. 
Diocese Pride Picnic

The 10 parishioners who participated in the study had a favorable experience and suggested that it be repeated this fall. One wrote: "The statistics about incarceration rates are staggering by themselves but, when coupled with the personal stories and videos in the Outrageous Justice series, I had a clearer understanding of the challenges facing both our society and incarcerated individuals."

Because of COVID-19, the soup kitchen is offering "to go" meals and requires fewer volunteers than it did previously. Here's what they need from St. James:

Although "altar stuff" has a mysterious aura around it, serving on altar guild is pretty simple and very rewarding.
