## 2023 Pilgrimage to the Holy Land

With Becky & Kip Coerper, there were 30 pilgrims in all who visited the Holy Land through St. George's College: 16 connected to St. James' though some were siblings and friends from elsewhere in the state and country. The remaining 14 travelers were from the US, Canada and Australia, and interestingly enough 16 of the 30 were clergy (which is an unusually high percentage) and 11 of those were women.

The pilgrims were based on Jerusalem most of the time, staying at the College which is on the grounds of the Anglican Cathedral in Jerusalem. But we took a three day trip to the Galilee, and stayed those night in Nazareth. The pilgrimage basically followed the chronology of Jesus' life and ministry, closing with walking the Via Dolorosa (Way of the Cross) in the old city of Jerusalem but also explored the present complex context of the Israeli-Palestinian social/political realities today. The trip began with a visit to the Mount of Olives overlooking Jerusalem and the temple Mount.
