# Skaneateles, NY What Is Blue Christmas?

Welcome to St. James' Church and tonight's celebration of Blue Christmas!

While this time of year brings great joy with the celebration of the birth of Jesus, there are many of us for whom this time of year is one of great pain. Perhaps it is the first Christmas without a loved one. Perhaps this time of year marks the anniversary of a great loss or conjures thoughts and feelings related to a past trauma. This is why Blue Christmas exists.

Tonight's liturgy is one in which we are still, quiet, and contemplative. We take time tonight to bring to mind those memories and images of pain and loss, and we pray for healing and hope. We light candles as signs of our prayers, write down those sorts, conditions, and people who are on our hearts this night, and we share in the Holy Eucharist, that sacred meal in which Christ's love is broken open for us, so that we who bring our broken hearts before the altar of God may find them mended.

Blue Christmas is intentionally celebrated on the Winter Solstice, preferably at dusk. This marks the longest night of the year, and for those of us living with grief and heartache this season, it can often feel like the nights are never-ending. Yet as we leave this holy space, we remember that from this point forward, the nights get a little shorter, until we are finally brought back into the full light of spring and Easter, when God brings new life out of that which had been frozen by winter.

As you enter the sanctuary, we ask that you do quietly and for the sake of those around you who wish to pray.

The sound of the ringing bowl will be your indication to stand, but please remember that if it is ok to sit if that is more comfortable. God will still be praised!

The music tonight is meant to be meditative and contemplative. If you wish to sing along to a favorite Christmas song that you hear, feel free to do so. Otherwise, you may wish to simply let the music wash over you as a prayer.

During the time of Music and Candlelighting, you will be invited to come forward to light a candle as a sign of your prayer this night. In similar fashion, you will find pieces of paper on which you may write your prayers, which will be deposited in the offertory baskets and placed on the altar as part of our Eucharistic Prayer. These participatory moments are optional, but we hope that you find some solace and peace in them. All may, some should, none must.

Whatever you are bringing with you tonight, we pray for God's mercy and blessings for you this holiday season, that you may know that God is with you throughout all the seasons of your life, and may the light of Christ that came at Christmas be your guide and guard all your days.

In the Bleak Midwinter

During the music, you are invited to write the names of those who have been lost or your experiences of loss and pain, as well as hope, that are weighing on your hearts and minds. Later, you will be invited to come forward and place those written prayers in the offering basket to be blessed as part of our celebration of Holy Communion.

#### A Litany of Remembrance

All stand at the sound of the bowl ring.

The first candle is lit.

Presider We light this first candle to remember those who have been loved and lost. We pause to

remember their names, their faces, their voices. We give thanks for the memory that binds

them to us in this season that anticipates Christ.

People May God's eternal love surround them.

Silence is kept.

The Minister leads the first verse.

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lowly exile here, until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

The second candle is lit.

Presider We light this second candle to redeem the pain of loss; the loss of relationships, the loss

of health, the loss of jobs, and the loss of financial security. As we gather up the pain of

the past, we offer it to you, O God, asking that you place the gift of peace into our open hearts and hands. We give thanks for your light that shines upon us and within us.

People Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

Silence is kept.

The Minister leads the second verse.

O come, our Wisdom from on high, who ordered all things mightily. To us the path of knowledge show, and teach us in Her ways to go. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

The third candle is lit.

Presider We light this third candle to remember ourselves at Christmas time. We remember the

past weeks, months, and for some of us, years of difficult times. We pause to remember the poignancy of the memories, the grief, the sadness, the hurt, and the pain that reflects

our mortality. We give thanks for the love that surrounds us on every side.

People Help us remember that dawn defeats the darkness.

Silence is kept.

The Minister leads the third verse.

O come, O rod of Jesse's stem, from every foe deliver them. That trust your mighty power to save, bring them in vict-ry through the grave. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

The fourth candle is lit.

Presider We light this fourth candle to remember the gift of faith and hope that God offers to us in

the Christmas story. We pause to remember that God in Christ, who shares our life, promises us a place and a time of no more pain and suffering. We rejoice, even in our sadness, that the Incarnation marks the beginning of the end of death's hold over us. We give thanks that God in Christ has come among us and still walks with us in every season

of life.

People Let us remember the One who shows the way and walks with us through every

journey of our lives.

Silence is kept.

The Minister leads the fourth verse.

O come, desire of nations bind, in one the hearts of all humankind; O bid our sad divisions cease, and be yourself the Prince of Peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

All are seated.

### **Music & Candlelighting**

During the music you are welcome to come forward and light a candle as a symbol of your prayer. You may deposit your written prayers in the offering basket.

#### **Prayers for Ourselves & Others**

Presider In this season of light, let us pray for all of us who are waiting in darkness.

Presider Glorious God, we remember your mighty deeds across the ages, the times you saved us

and brought us home. Yet we also remember the times when we felt alone and afraid. Receive these prayers from your faithful people. Give us all strength and courage to meet

the days ahead.

People Look upon us with your shining face, especially in our time of need.

Presider Redeeming God, we remember those who are oppressed by poverty and discrimination,

by political upheaval and dangerous rulers.

People Right what is wrong among us and within us, and restore us to you, to others, to our

planet, and to ourselves.

Presider Healing God, make the brokenhearted whole again; comfort those who mourn; repair our

damaged world; and fill the hungry with good things.

People In all the tossing and turning of our days, do not let us lose sight of you or those

whom you came to serve.

Presider Holy God, in the stillness of this night, we give thanks for the Light whom no darkness

can overcome, and we rejoice in your promises, which are faithful and mighty to save.

People Light of the world, live among us, full of grace and truth.

Presider In all of our beginnings and in our endings, may we be one with you eternally; through

Christ, and in the unity of the Holy Spirit, we praise you almighty God, now and forever.

Amen.

*Presider* The Peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The Ministers and People greet one another in the name of the Lord and are seated.

The People remain standing as the Presider recalls God's work in creation and Christ's Last Supper.

The Presider prays that the gifts and People may be blessed and sanctified by God. When the Presider concludes the prayer, the People loudly respond, "AMEN!"

Presider Holding our experiences of pain and loss, and looking with expectant hope for the

coming of the Light of God into the world, let us pray together the prayer that our Lord

Jesus taught us:

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy

will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom,

and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

People We who are many are one Body, for we all share in the one Bread.

The Presider invites the People to receive the Communion of Our Lord. All who desire a deeper relationship with Christ are welcome to come forward. If you do not wish to receive, please come forward for a blessing. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request.

When all have received, the Presider returns to the Holy Table. All stand at the sound of the bowl ring.

Presider Let us pray.

People Loving God, we give you thanks for restoring us in your image and nourishing

us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Now send us forth, a people forgiven, healed, renewed; that we may proclaim your love to the world and continue in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior Amen.

The Presider offers a blessing, and the People respond, 'Amen.'
