The Gospel Mark 11: 1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting.

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

Deacon The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Mark.

All are seated. The congregation may follow the dramatic reading of the Passion in the bulletin insert. The People collectively speak at the lines marked 'CONGREGATION.'

All stand at the line: 'Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him.'

A period of silence is kept after the line: 'Having said this, he breathed his last.' Those who wish may kneel.

At the completion of the Passion, all are seated for a period of silent reflection. Some may wish to kneel.

All stand at the sound of the bell ring.

The Prayers

Silence is kept after each petition.

The Presider prays a concluding Collect, and the People respond, 'Amen.'

The Confession & Absolution

Deacon Let us confess our sins to God.

All God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and

the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us, through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

The People greet one another in the name of the Lord and are seated.

During Communion, Prayer Ministers are available at either end of the altar rail to pray with anyone who is in need.
