

Easter Season Bible Study: The Radical Love of Jesus

Christ is Risen! Celebrate the new church season by joining the St. James' Easter Season Bible study: "The Radical Love of Jesus," at 6 p.m. May 1, 8 and 15 in the Lakeside Room. The study is presented by the Racial Justice and Reconciliation Commission (RJRC). Light snacks will be served. The sessions are as follows:

May 1: The Good Samaritan: Not the Sunday School version May 8: Peacemakers vs Peacekeepers

May 15: Reuniting with the Real Jesus

The sessions are based on the thoughts and writings of theologian Howard Thurman's (1899-1981) "Jesus and the Disinherited," sermons by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929-1968), theologian John Dear's "The Gospel of Peace," and theologian Jim Wallis' "The False White Gospel."

A Letter from Cindi Fowler-Leader of the Mini-Saints

The Minis enjoy singing our opening worshipful songs and they listen and watch intently to the Bible story of the day as it is told in the center of our circle on the rug. This year after Christmas we introduced new stories focused on Jesus' ministry which took place near the sea of Galilee. We heard how he called his "friends" to follow him, how he healed many people and calmed the stormy waters. The children seem to relate easily to the stories. The "wondering" questions, for me, are the richest part of the storytelling. The leader always asks open questions to conclude the story designed to help children focus on Jesus' humanity and to connect with how the people in the story are feeling. Two weeks ago we laid cloaks and palms on the "road" to Jerusalem. When we "wondered" how Jesus felt when all the people were shouting "Hosanna" to him, a couple children said "happy" or "excited, and one perceptive five year old replied, "nervous." This past week featured Jesus' Last Passover, which tells briefly about the crucifixion and that "God did an amazing thing. God made Jesus alive again." During our wondering questions one child immediately questioned..."Is this in real life?" and "Does God make people alive again now?" Big, deep questions for little ones and for us. It is such a privilege to experience God together with this precious group! This summer we will be seeking more helpers and offer a training to allow more parents and adults to assist in this amazing class! Watch for these training communications!

Safe and Warm, our lunch making and delivering project to the homeless in motels in Cayuga County is celebrating one year of weekly deliveries on Friday afternoons. It has grown from 50 meals to 150 plus additional sandwiches per week. The lunches now include two fruits and a cheese stick along with PBJ's. We also distribute personal care items, warm winter hats and gloves and feminine sanitary supplies, because these products are not covered by any checks these families receive.

If you would like to help with this ongoing work, there are several ways to do so: 1. Come by the church on Friday afternoons at 1:15 PM to help put lunches together 2. Volunteer to go out and help with the delivery 3, Donate Peanut butter and Jelly or a Wegmans, TOPS or BJ's gift card. Food is our only real expense. 4. Did You Know? By Emma Cowley

Black musicians played a fundamental role in the origins of country music, shaping its sound, instrumentation, and rhythms. Their influence can be traced back to the 19th and early 20th centuries through the blending of African and European musical traditions in the American South.

- The Banjo Originally an African instrument brought to America through the transatlantic slave trade, the banjo became a central instrument in early country music. Enslaved Africans crafted and played early versions of the banjo, influencing white musicians who later incorporated it into folk and country styles.
- 2. **Blues and Field Hollers** The melodic and lyrical structures of country music were deeply influenced by Black musical traditions, particularly the blues, work songs, and field hollers. The storytelling and emotional depth found in country music owe much to these Black traditions.
- 3. **Fiddle and String Bands** Black and white musicians often played together in the South, exchanging techniques and styles. Early string bands, which shaped country music's sound, often featured Black musicians who brought syncopation and improvisation to their performances.
- 4. **Influential Black Artists** Musicians like DeFord Bailey, a harmonica player and the first Black star of the Grand Ole Opry, helped establish country music as a commercial genre. Other lesser-known Black musicians, including Arnold Shultz (who influenced Bill Monroe and bluegrass music), played crucial roles but were often overlooked in mainstream history.
- 5. **Gospel and Spirituals** Many elements of gospel music, rooted in Black church traditions, found their way into country music's vocal delivery and themes of hardship, faith, and perseverance. Despite their contributions, Black artists were often excluded from mainstream recognition in country music's early history. However, their impact remains undeniable, shaping the genre's sound and continuing to inspire artists today.
