## **CARING CONVERSATIONS**



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- The twelve days of Christmas have not ended. Why do you think some people take down their decorations early? When do you take down your decorations?
- Why is the message of Christmas so important to hear again and again?

### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Ephesians 1:3-14 and John 1:1-18.

After the celebrations, it is hard to remember that we are still in the season of Christmas, a time to focus on the power, meaning, and joy of Christ's birth. This is when "the Word became flesh and lived among us" (John 1:14). It is good to know that we are children of God. Ephesians lifts this up by noting that we are adopted. The Greek text makes it clear that we are adopted like a son. At that time, it was the son who inherited all that the father had. We, as those adopted by God, are heirs to all that God has. What an amazing message, filled with "grace and truth" (John 1:17). John uses the word grace (undeserved kindness) four times in this reading, but never again. The rest of the Gospel gives us examples of this grace through light, bread, wine, vines, water, and more. The Christmas message is worthy of an entire season to envision and digest again and again. God comes in human form to touch us with "grace upon grace" (John 1:16) that we may know that we are children and heirs of all that God gives us.

Discuss: How can you continue to celebrate and live the message of Christmas?

Pray: O God of Christmas joy, remind us of your grace and truth that makes us heirs of eternal gladness through the Word that became flesh and now still lives among us. Amen.

# **SERVICE**



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you show kindness to someone this week?

## **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**



Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5). Sit in a room after dark, turn the lights out, and light a candle. Say: Jesus Christ is the light of the world. The light no darkness can overcome.

Take a moment to think or talk about the difference between light and darkness. How does it feel to be in the dark? What does the light provide that darkness does not? Say a prayer of thanks to Jesus for being the light that darkness cannot overcome.
