#### **Anglican Prayer Beads**


The Anglican form of this rosary style prayer method came out of a contemplative prayer group that met in the mid 1980's. The thirty-three bead design was created by the Rev. Lynn Bauman.

The use of the Prayer Beads encourages contemplative prayer by bringing our whole self into prayer – body, mind, and spirit. The pressure of our fingers on the beads helps to keep our mind from wandering and the rhythm of the prayers leads us into stillness.

#### The Structure of Anglican Prayer Beads

The Invitatory Bead just above the Cross is an invitation to praise and worship God much like the Invitatory (opening psalm) of the Daily Office. The Invitatory Bead is an entry point into the circle of prayer.

The four Cruciform Beads
remind us that the Cross is the
central symbol of Christian
faith. They also symbolize the
seasons of the solar year
(spring, summer, fall, and winter)
and the four points on the
compass, bringing to mind the created worlds.



**The Weeks** are the four groups of seven beads. The Weeks remind us of the days of Creation, the temporal week, the seasons of the Church year (Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, and Pentecost) and the seven Sacraments (Holy Eucharist, Baptism, Confirmation, Ordination, Holy Matrimony, Reconciliation of a Penitent, and Unction). The number seven also signifies wholeness or completion.

Are you thirsty for a closer relationship with Jesus, God and the Holy Spirit in simple everyday ways? We invite you to drop in and learn about various ways to pray, listen to each other's experiences, and take home ideas for practicing prayer -- real ways of connecting with the One who comes afresh into our hearts again and again.

Advent is a shared experience of meditation and prayer that celebrates the hope-filled arrival of Jesus. Let's join together in this exploration. We will generally meet in-between Services on Sunday mornings from 9:40 a.m. in the Toppie Bates Lakeside room







# Celebrating With Your Advent Wreath

The first purple candle represents the long years of waiting for a Savior. It is the anticipation and hope that the Messiah is coming.

The second purple

The second purple candle represents Israel's preparation for the Christ child and our preparation for the second coming of Jesus. The third candle lit, the rose

candle, represents rejoicing, the joy that the Messiah is coming and you're getting closer.

The third purple candle represents the peace that God gives to all who wait on Him.

The optional white candle in the center of your Advent wreath is actually not for Advent. Advent ends on Christmas Eve. This candle is lit on Christmas Day as a celebration of Jesus' birth.

Place your wreath in a central location in your home, where everyone can enjoy it.

#### The Advent Calendar

These fun calendars, based on a centuries-old German tradition, are among the most popular traditions.

As you celebrate Advent with your family this year, consider using the traditional Advent calendar to make these time-honored traditions and deep spiritual truths come alive. This Advent calendar offers a wonderful opportunity to make Christ the center of your Christmas celebration as family members count down the days to the prophesied birth of the Savior of the world.

Christmas is far more than what our cultural celebrations have made of it. Especially for Christians. When this time of year comes, we pay attention to what is at the center of it all. We may enjoy the carols and decorations, but we celebrate the Advent of Jesus Christ. In his letter written from Tegel prison camp, Dietrich Bonhoeffer penned these words to his parents. "We can, and should also, celebrate Christmas despite the ruins around us....I think of you as you now sit together with the children and with all the Advent decorations — as in earlier years you did with us. We must do all this, even more intensively because we do not know how much longer we have."


#### **Families**

Many say they don't know how to help people. Volunteering a few hours a month at the Thrift Shop actually helps lots of people.



#### Did You Know? By Emma Cowley

Tanisha M. Jackson is an assistant professor of African American studies at Syracuse University and she has written a book called "Black Women's Art Ecosystems-Sites of Wellness and Self-Care." Jackson explores how Black women artists use their art as a form of self-care, healing, and empowerment. She shows that art is more than creative expression — it's a way to resist

oppression, build community, and support mental and emotional wellness. Jackson connects past and present, showing how Black women's artistic traditions have long created spaces for restoration, identity, and strength. #### Decorations and atmosphere

- Use natural decorations: Deck your halls with real branches, pinecones, and dried fruit instead of plastic.
- Reuse and repair: Revitalize old or gently used decorations instead of buying new, single-season plastic items.
- Switch to LED lights: Use energy-efficient LED Christmas lights, which last longer and consume less energy.
- Get creative with art: Use crayons to create special, reusable decorations like a 12-days-of-Christmas candle from the nubs of old crayons.

#### Gifts and wrapping

- Give experiences: Gift tickets to events, spa treatments, or classes instead of physical items to create lasting memories.
- Create homemade gifts: Make handcrafted items like candles, knit scarves, or baked goods to reduce massproduced waste.
- Swap gently used items: Organize a gift exchange where people swap new or gently used items like books or mugs.
- Choose sustainable wrapping: Use reusable gift bags, fabric, or scarves instead of plastic-coated wrapping paper, which contaminates recycling bins.
- Reuse and save bows and ribbons: Save shiny bows and ribbons for future use, as they are not recyclable and can damage machinery.

#### Food and waste reduction

- Minimize single-use plastics: Avoid single-use plastics like cutlery, plates, cups, and straws during holiday gatherings.
- Compost food scraps: Compost food scraps to create nutrient-rich soil and keep waste out of landfills.
- Support local and native: Buy from local businesses that use sustainable practices and consider planting native plants in your garden to preserve biodiversity.

John Gillmeister is a third year seminarian attending Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity school in Rochester, NY. St. James' is lucky to welcome him as part of our family while he continues his journey to ordination. John's spiritual journey begins as a child being brought up by his mother and father with the help of his maternal grandmother, who instilled in him a deep love of the Lord and a passion for loving people. After graduating from Oneida high school, John initially attended Alfred University, where he played football and was a part of their BAFA fine arts program. Halfway through his junior year, John felt "the road" calling to him and toured in a band extensively throughout the United States. John and his friends jumped in a 15-passenger van and played punk rock music from Massachusetts to California and back. When the band he played in broke up, John returned to school and graduated from SUNY New Paltz with a BA in Art History. In 2018, John discerned a call from the Holy Spirit to pursue discernment for the priesthood. John felt ill-equipped, unqualified and resisted this call as long as he could. Only relenting when he says "God ran me down and I was just too tired to run anymore." #### Robbie Padilla is excited to join St. James as the new organist!

Robbie's organ journey began during his graduate studies at Syracuse University. He spent his Sunday mornings playing piano at First Presbyterian Church in Chittenango, serving with choir director Michael Larkin. Being a pianist who kind-of-sort-of played organ, Robbie took full advantage of the instruction of SU's then-new organ professor Annie Laver and subsequently bought his first pair of organ shoes. Before Syracuse, Robbie spent his undergraduate college years studying music education at SUNY Fredonia. No organ-ing happened there, but he attributes much of his skills as a solo and collaborative pianist to the fantastic teachers he had in the music building. Coincidentally, Robbie also met Mother Pilar at Fredonia, only to reunite 15 years later!

Robbie spent his first few post-graduate years teaching a wide range of grade levels and disciplines within the field of music education. Some of these teaching experiences included Pre-K through 6th grade general music as well as 5th through 8th grade chorus in the Fulton City School District and a long-term substitute assignment as Jamesville-Dewitt teaching high school band and orchestra.

Since 2020, Robbie has earned a living teaching piano lessons, along with a little guitar and ukulele. In addition to teaching, he performs regularly as a solo and collaborative pianist with student and professional musicians. Some of Robbie's regular professional collaborations include Syracuse Stage, The Syracuse Orchestra, and recitals with talented soloists in the area. Though Robbie is originally from Western New York, he has lived in the Syracuse area long enough to call home. He now lives in Liverpool with his wife Christine, baby Olive, and cats Max and Piper.
