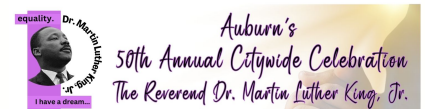
Racial Justice & Reconciliation Commission Honoring Martin Luther King, Jr.

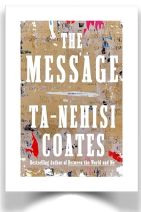

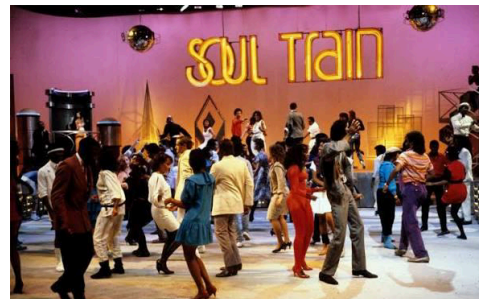

Did You Know? By Emma Cowley The show Soul Train was groundbreaking in the way it celebrated Black culture, identity, and excellence on national television. At a time when Black Americans were often misrepresented or marginalized in the media, the show offered a powerful counter-narrative. First, Soul Train showcased Black joy, confidence, and creativity. Through music and dance, it highlighted everyday Black people expressing pride in their style, rhythm, and individuality.

The dancers were not stereotypes—they were trendsetters whose fashion, hair, and

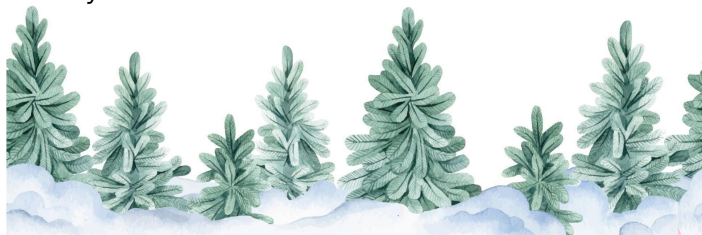
moves influenced popular culture worldwide. Second, the show centered Black artists and music. It gave a national platform to Black musicians—especially soul, funk, and later hip-hop artists—allowing them to perform authentically without having to conform to white industry standards. This reinforced the value and richness of Black artistic expression. Third, Soul Train promoted positive self-representation and economic empowerment. Created and hosted by Don Cornelius, a Black entrepreneur, the show demonstrated Black ownership and control in television media. Cornelius's polished presentation challenged racist assumptions and projected professionalism, dignity, and pride. Overall, Soul Train helped normalize positive images of Black America by celebrating culture, talent, and self-expression. It affirmed Black identity on its own terms and played a major role in shaping how Black Americans saw themselves—and how the world saw Black America.



New Pastoral Care Training Starts in March! The pastoral needs of St. James' is immense. One priest can't handle it alone. St. James' has a team of trained volunteers who assist in pastoral care by meeting with sick or in need parishioners to listen and be a loving presence. Two years ago St. James' trained 18 people in a mini pastoral care program, highlighting the most important components to help others. This group reaches out with care to others at St. James and beyond. We are ready to add numbers to our pastoral team and spread more ways to care for others. Nominations by petition shall be submitted to the Chair of the Nominating Committee (Doug Smith) at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the Annual Meeting, but not more than thirty (30) days prior. (Accordingly, the dates for submitting nominations by petition for 2026 are January 18-31.)
